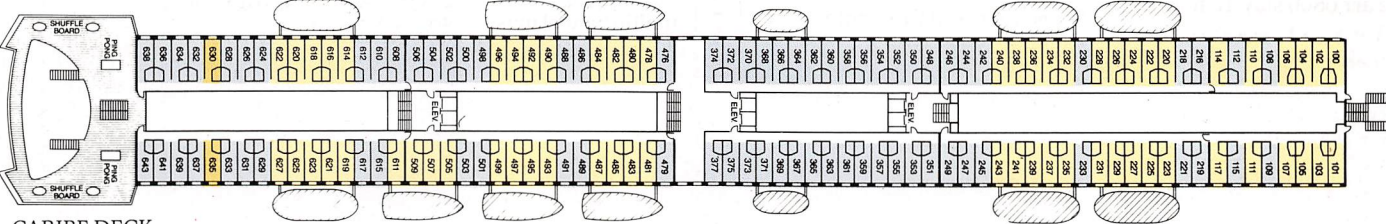

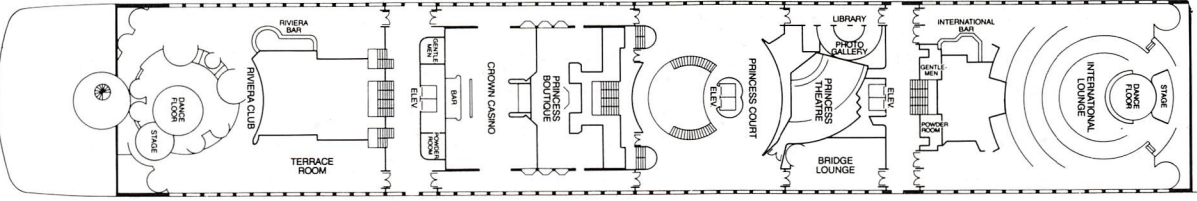

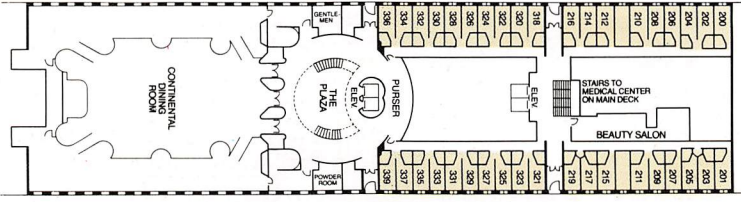


DOLPHIN DECK (Promenade)

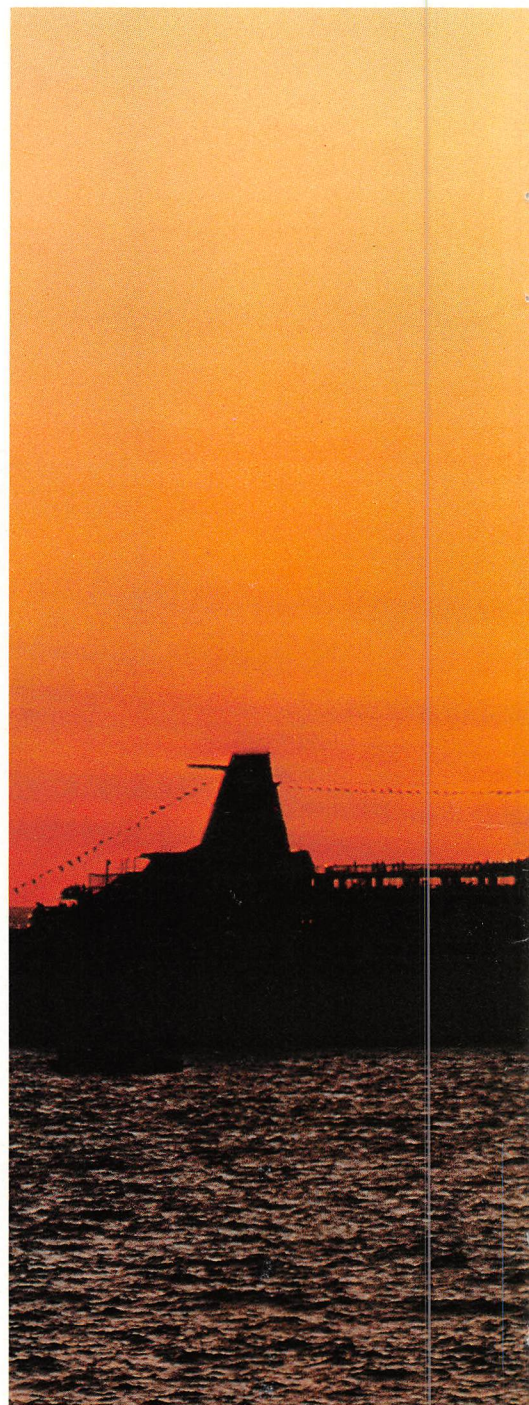
ZIHUATANEJO, a former fishing village, nestles peacefully amid wooded hills and rocky crags. A short trip up the coast will bring
